I am pleased to add Our Gallery of Pentwater, MI to the list of fine art galleries selling my work.

Our Gallery was founded in 1987 by artists Bert and Cheri Petri. Patric and Marilyn Sullivan joined the gallery as partners in 2004. Patric is the office manager and Marilyn is the jewelry buyer.

I will be at Our Gallery to meet and greet Friday evening and Saturday afternoon of July 11th and 12th. While there I will be working on my current piece, a large table top size Whitetail buck. We will be offering this at special Pre Cast pricing, typically a 25% savings.

The Friday evening of my visit is Pentwater's weekly "Art Stroll". If you're in the area, stop in for good wine, a little cheese and of course, art.

In this issue I would like to continue with the Elk and concentrate on their fascinating breeding season commonly referred to as the rut.

The timing of the rutting period is determined by photoperiodism . That is the biological response to the shortening of days. Thus it occurs about the same time at the same latitude every year. This is contrary to some popular belief that the weather has an effect on the timing. The timing is designed so calves are born at the most optimum time in the spring. The bulls that hung together in bachelor groups during the summer are now rivals contending for the same cows. The goal is to gather as many cows that will be coming into estrus into a harem and maintaining the group for the duration of rut.

The cows' life is normal continuing with grazing and resting. Bulls however eat and rest little not wanting to risk losing a cow to a rival bull. Passing on good genes has its costs. All this leaves the bulls in a depleted state just prior to winter. Some don't make it to Spring.

Bulls urinate on their necks and bellies soaking themselves in what I would describe as a musky and almost pine scent. They also rub musk from their preorbital gland, in front of their eye, on brush and saplings to advertise their presence. Some bulls roll in shallow wallows; urine soaked mud puddles. As with other antlered game, they also rub their antlers on saplings and small trees. Cows don't seem to be impressed with all this posturing and just play along with the game.

The bugling of the bull is his advertisement to cows that he will produce the best offspring. While most bugling is heard in the cool of early mornings and evenings, we have heard them all night long while camping in Elk country.

Listen to bull Elk bugle on my web site. A few years ago we were in Yellowstone filming wildlife for future sculptures. Using my video camera, I was able to capture an audio clip. It's not top notch, but it will give a taste of one of my favorite sounds.

Fights between rival bulls are not uncommon and occasionally even fatal. We have witnessed a couple of fights. Most memorable was one we saw here in Michigan. The loser walked off with his head down, almost as if he were pouting. He came by us within forty yards but didn't even acknowledge our presence. I guess he was too ashamed. For this bull Elk it's time to rest and brace himself for a long winter. The constant pressure from other bulls wanting to steal his harem has taken its toll. Passing on good genes has its costs. Having not eaten much through the breeding season he's lost crucial fat reserves. From that look you can almost see him thinking – "You really don't want to mess with me right now".
